### **Principal's Report**

It's been so wonderful to welcome family members back on site over the last week and have visitors to our school! With further easing of restrictions, DET revises their Operational Guidelines regularly (we're up to our 10th for the term), and whilst it can be challenging to continually change our plans, we are committed to implementing any changes as quickly as we can, so that families can join us onsite for our traditional celebrations and events. The last week has been very busy as we have worked hard to reinstate our normal end of year events.

The Grade Two students greatly enjoyed their 'Twilight Fun' at school last Thursday and even though they couldn't sleepover they enjoyed the activities their teachers had planned. As they left in their pyjamas, it was evident from their smiles and laughter, that they'd had a terrific time. Special thanks to teachers Alison, Claire, Laura, Jesse, ES staff Lynette and pre-service teacher Sharon, for helping them build great memories of their Grade Two year.

We continue to return to normal with the Prep and Grade One 'Breakfast At School' tomorrow morning. Families will be able to drop their excited children at their classrooms at 8am, so they can create their own happy memories.

We are working hard to have Graduation as close to normal as possible for our Grade Six students and parents will be sent information by the end of the week.



The Christmas Picnic will be held on Monday 11th December, 5:30pm – 7:00pm. Thank you to the families who indicated they will be attending. This has always been a great way to come together as a community on the last Monday of the term, and share a meal and some fun family activities. As I stated in the COMPASS post, we believe that this year, more than any other, the chance to celebrate together as a whole community is important, however we also understand that many families may not be able to attend. Often grandparents and extended family members come along and join in the fun, and this year is no exception. All family members are welcome to attend! Since the event is outdoors, masks only need to be worn if physical distancing can't occur.

Weather permitting, the event will begin at 5:30pm on the oval and conclude at 7:00pm. Traditionally, families had a choice of bringing their own picnic or purchasing dinner from the Parents and Friends BBQ. Unfortunately our COVID Safe Plan does not allow us to run the BBQ this year, however families can still bring some chairs or a rug, sit under the trees and enjoy their picnic dinner. We'll conclude the evening with the junior and senior schools singing a carol and this year we thought it would be an excellent way to have all parents and carers joining in with the final carol.

Mrs Mac is a very experienced teacher who fosters a love of learning in her sessions and we were very fortunate she was able to provide consistency in the 2020 Prep learning program.

### **Victorian High-Ability Program**


Aiden L, Sienna W and Emma B are nearing the end of the 10 week Victorian High-Ability Program.


#### Zucchini Slice

- •Grease and line a 30 x 20cm lamington pan. Pour into the prepared pan and bake in oven for 30 minutes or until cooked through.






