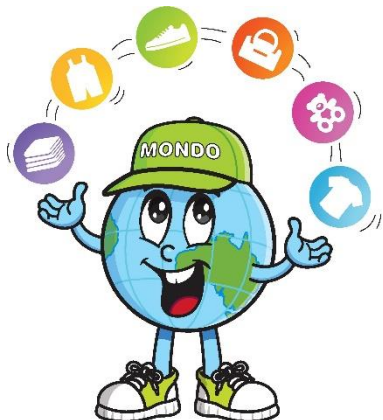


Emergency Management Drills

Student safety is paramount at Greensborough Primary and for this reason we conduct emergency management drills each term which include management of Anaphylactic Reaction and Evacuation/Lock In Drills. These drills ensure students, staff and onsite visitors are well prepared should an actual emergency occur at school. (Families who have been at GPS for several years may remember when a kangaroo made its way into our grounds and we were 'locked in' until Animal Rescue arrived to safely relocate our marsupial visitor!)

In both our evacuation and anaphylactic drills in the last fortnight, we were very pleased with the response time of students and staff. During recess one of our students feigned an anaphylactic reaction and students and staff responded according to our Anaphylaxis Management Plan. We are very pleased that our response was timely and the students and staff acted quickly as they had practised in class. The student's epipen was 'administered' one minute from the onset of his reaction and his 'recovery' was prompt. Thank you to all families who remain vigilant and refrain from sending nuts or nut products to school for snacks and lunches.

Southern Cross Recycling Tuesday March 16th



Each term we encourage families to recycle their unwanted household goods by having a collection day at school. This day is usually towards the end of each term, except for fourth term when it is held in Recycling Week in November. Our unwanted items are recycled in communities that will benefit from them and our Grade 6 students also benefit as we are paid a small amount per kilogram and the monetary proceeds are placed in the Grade 6 Graduation Celebration budget. This recycling project was placed on hold due to COVID-19 restrictions last year, however under current guidelines we are able to resume this sustainable practice. We encourage families to clear out your cupboards and send along manchester, kitchen goods, toys, clothing, shoes, books....in fact anything except electrical goods are acceptable. Signs

and tables will be placed inside the door near the hall from Monday 1st March, for you to drop off your goods.

For our curriculum Day on March 5th we will be combining with other schools in our North East Small Schools Team (NESST) and our focus will be on Professional Development for the DET initiative 'Respectful Relationships', as well as establishing goals within our Professional Learning Teams for the remainder of the year.

Grade 6 Leadership Day

Today, Maria Grima, myself and the Grade 6 students will attend a Leadership Day with other Grade 6 students from NESST schools. This is the first time our school has participated in this activity and we are looking forward to our students collaborating with their peers from other schools and developing leadership skills in indoor and outdoor activities. In the afternoon session, Maya Dove, a para athlete will speak to the students about Resilience, Determination, Role Models and Goal Setting.

2022 Prep Enrolments

If any families know anyone who is coming to Greensborough Primary next year, please encourage them to register their details as soon as possible, (this includes siblings of current students). We have already had a number of enquiries and school tours for places in 2022 and the sooner we get a sense of our intake for next year, the sooner we can start planning for grade structures.

Late Arrival To School

We are very concerned that a number of students are regularly arriving late to school. This is very unsettling to students as they miss the very important introduction to class programs and it also disrupts the learning of the class, as the teacher has to interrupt their teaching time with their group to explain the Learning Intention and activity to be completed.

The best time for students to arrive at school is at **8.45am** when a teacher is on yard duty and classroom doors are opened for students to enter, unpack bags, put drink bottles in classrooms and follow their grade's morning routine. Once this is done, students are free to go outside to play until the music begins or stay inside and chat with their peers and class teachers.

We've been very pleased that many parents and family members are able to join us, practising safe social distancing, for assembly on Monday afternoons at 3pm on the netball court. A reminder that if the weather is very hot or inclement, we will need to move assembly indoors to the hall and unfortunately, family members will not be able to attend.

CSEF – Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund applications

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.



If you have a valid means-tested concession card, such as a Centrelink Health Care Card, you may be eligible. Payment amounts this year are \$125 for eligible primary school students. Payments are made direct to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions and sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

If you applied for CSEF through our school last year, you may need to complete an application form this year, if your family circumstances. However, we will need a copy of your current Health Care Card. If you would like to apply for the first time, please contact the school office on 03 9435 1496 and ask for an application form.

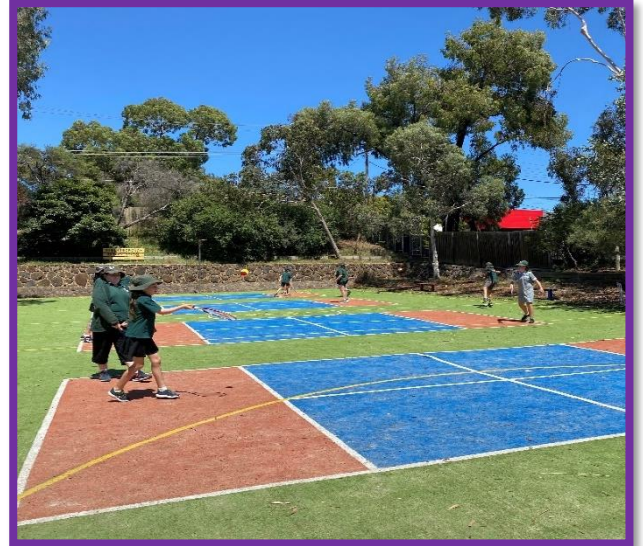


PE Report – Term 1

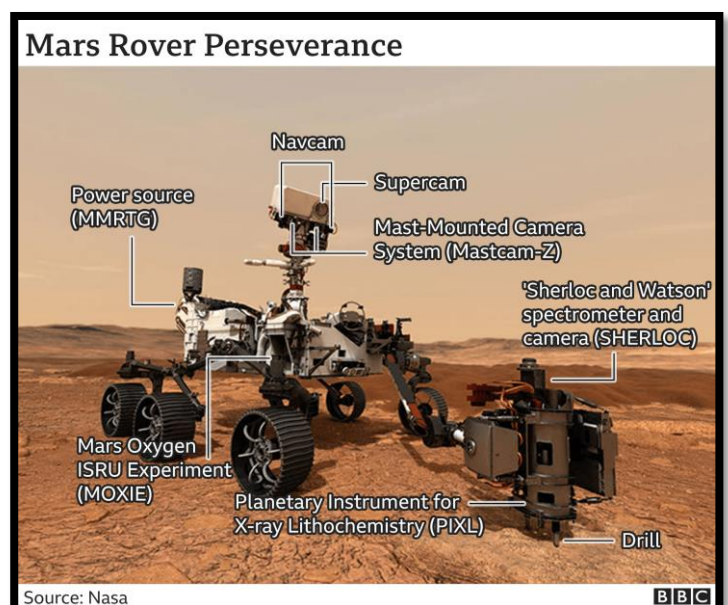
We also are going to send Greensborough Primary School to space on the next Mars mission, with NASA's 'Send your name to space campaign'.

Welcome back to school ...

Healthy Schools Banyule (HSB) partnered with local schools to support student transition from primary to secondary school.

In term 4 2020, Olympic Village PS (OVPS) conducted a four week Garden/ Nutrition / Cooking project called 'The Plot'. In this edition we will share some of the activities and recipes that we got up to. Who would have guessed 'eggs' would become the hero of many of our sessions?

First day of school 2021, we had great fun at the Year 7 'Welcome Day' at Montmorency Secondary College, where we chatted to students about healthy eating and drinking, encouraging the packing of healthy lunchboxes and choosing tap water as their preferred choice of drink. We asked a sample of students about their water consumption and knowledge, with interesting results. A 'Cup Stacking' competition was a perfect way to remind students to try to consume 6-8 cups of water a day (remembering that water is also found in food), so as to stay hydrated, alert, strong and ready to learn. What a delightful bunch, we really enjoyed sharing with them their first day of secondary school life!

Then, a few days into the new school year and statewide restrictions are back... you know the drill! It's important to stay healthy and connected. And one of the best ways to reduce your risk of Covid-19, is to practice good hygiene and boost your immune system by staying well with healthy food and drinks, along with exercise which can be as simple as taking a walk.
