Principal's Report

Thank you to all the families who supported the Parents and Friends barbeque on Election Day. It was wonderful to see many 'new' faces, as well as 'old' on the roster and several parents volunteered their time for more than one hour, which was a terrific effort. Thankyou also to the parents/carers who baked goods for the cake stall or brought the family along for a sausage after voting. We appreciate your support for GPS in whatever capacity you're able to give. Special thanks to P&F President Kim H, who spent many hours organising the roster, purchasing goods and being present on the day, for set-up, sales and clean-up. Over \$1400 profit was made on the day, which is outstanding! We're very grateful for P&F support for school programs, resources or Buildings and Grounds additions.



A highlight on election day was seeing artist Coree Thorpe and his parents Lyn and Alister complete our Creation Mural. Jesse Stephens has written more information about the mural later in the newsletter,

including the background story to the Arts and Culture Community grant application. I encourage everyone to walk past and take a close look at the discs of local flora and fauna, painted by our Grade 5/6 students which will be part of their legacy for their years at GPS. Looking at the mural from a distance gives a different perspective and we can see the outline of Bunjil, the eagle, flying protectively over the mural. I'd like to acknowledge Banyule Council for their support with the grant. When we initially applied for the grant, Council indicated they may be able to support us with a Smoking Ceremony to celebrate the mural and bring people together and we will follow up this offer.

It's been a busy fortnight for the progression of our grant works. The refurbishment of our outside toilet blocks will begin next Monday 5th December and screening will be erected to allow access to workers only. Students will use the inside toilets which fortunately also have a door leading to the exterior of the school near the Grade 1/2 classrooms for use during recess and lunch breaks. Over the school holidays works on this block will be completed and work will then begin on the inside toilets.

We also had a site visit with 'Castle and Cubby' to discuss the installation of 'Tiny Town'. Wayne, Geoff and I met with Jonathan to inspect the site and consider location of buildings and site preparation. We're looking forward to receiving their design layout and anticipate the buildings will be installed in Term One next year.

Cyber safety Workshops

Thank you to School Council member and parent Edward D, who is presenting Cybersafety workshops to our Prep – Six classes next Tuesday 6th December. Ed will present 'Cyber Safe Kids', which is a free educational program run by Palo Alto Networks. The company's mission is to teach children the life skills they need to protect their digital way of life. <u>Cyber Safe Kids</u> resources cover topics like strong passwords, scams/phishing, cyber bullying, and protecting personal information. They offer free learning resources and workshops to help drive online safety awareness.

Many students will increase their online presence over the school holidays, so we are very grateful that Eddie is able to present these workshops free of charge to support keeping our students safe online.

Friendship Tree

Thank you to all the families who donated items for the Wellbeing Leaders to use to decorate the Friendship Tree. It's been lovely to see the fun and excitement students from Prep – Six, have had decorating the tree each lunchtime. Bunjil – The Eagle Mural

By now you will have seen the amazing mural on the corner of Grimshaw Street and The Circuit! We are so fortunate to have had the opportunity to have this incredible installation outside our school! For something that seems to have sprung out of nowhere, there is a long story behind it that we are proud to share with you.

During the early COVID Lockdowns, when community spirit was high, we sought to capture this in artwork and on the fence line. A variety of ideas were floated but, in keeping with the Banyule Vision for Arts and Culture Strategic Plan 2017-2021 & Innovate: Reconciliation Action Plan in Banyule, the project itself transformed into an act of reconciliation, strength and unity within our community.

'Mam-Badool Djerring', meaning 'let's work together', ensured we developed an art installation that combined Wurundjeri Woi-Wurrung perspectives and storytelling with Non-Indigenous perspectives. This is why you can see both Indigenous and Non-Indigenous elements within the mural, both in the artistic style as well as within the story itself.

We are so proud to share this with you all. We feel that by better understanding our shared history through the telling of Bunjil the Eagle and his Creation, we can better unite and look forward to improving our community connectedness and cohesion.

Banyule, meaning 'Hill', places the story of creation at our place of learning. The circular elements show the cyclical nature of time and history, signifying that creation itself is not one that is past but one that is forever present. Bunjil is the creator spirit for the Wurundjeri people – he created the people, animals and plants and he is watching how we respect the land from above. Our Grade 5/6 students painted the discs attached to the mural, depicting the native flora and fauna indigenous to our area. Please take the time to visit the mural and explore the story within.



We would like to thank Coree Thorpe, a Yorta Yorta, Gunnai, Gunditjmara and Wurundjeri man and artist who shared our vision for the mural and the fabulous artwork completed by our 5/6 students!

Welcome Letters for New Australian Citizens





Student Wellbeing



Hi Everyone!



In a few weeks, many students in our school community will be facing CHANGE, as they look ahead to 2023. They will be changing grades with new teachers in most cases; some will be leaving us to begin secondary school; and others will be changing primary schools and/or moving house.

CHANGE brings many emotions - excitement, joy nervousness, uncertainty, fear, anxiousness, etc.

Preparing our children well ahead will help to ease their concerns. How we respond and cope with CHANGE for ourselves will have a huge impact on how our children will cope.


Children need to be prepared for changes ahead to make them feel secure. Children thrive on routine and on knowing what is happening next.

THINKING AHEAD – Helping Your Child Cope with School Transitions

To assist them with transitions the following ideas may be helpful:

If the family is moving, take pictures of friends and familiar places and offer ways to keep in contact with close friends via phone, email, and letters. Help your child talk about what he or she will miss and about what will be new and different.

Encourage your child to discuss the future transition by asking questions such as, "What have you been thinking about your new school?" Make a list of your child's concerns and together try to find answers to the questions. Many schools have websites that describe procedures, show virtual tours, and answer common questions.



Help your child get to know the new environment beforehand. When possible,

visit the school together. Even viewing it from a car or seeing a photograph of the building is better than leaving the first day to the child's imagination.

Let your child know it is natural to feel apprehensive. He or she may be fearful of not being accepted by peers or about mastering the logistics or academics of a new grade or school. Share childhood memories of times when you were worried about a new situation. Relate the good things that happened like how you met your best friend or that your new teacher was one of your favourites.

Keep the days leading up to the transition as positive as you can - Stress that his or her class will offer many new experiences. The night before the first day, have your child put out everything needed for school. The next morning allow time to get ready in a calm manner.

Buy school supplies and required materials. Go over the walk to school or to the bus stop. Empower your child by discussing actions he or she can take if a problem arises. Ask, "What concerns you most about school?" Listen and then ask, "If that happens, what will you do?" Help your child think of constructive ways to deal with a difficult situation.

Expect the transition to be ultimately successful. Yet, remember that adjustments take time and the first days in a new school are often overwhelming. Your attitude can help your child; let him or her know you are confident in his ability to adjust well.

Be available after school starts . Understand that your child may need extra time, attention and support. When there is a change, he or she may regress to an earlier developmental stage. Try to plan time for family fun because, when transitions occur, families are a necessary source of love and support.

Invite your child to express his or her emotions. Even when a concern seems minor to you, be respectful and know that it can be a major crisis to your child. Try to put yourself in his or her place and understand the

feelings expressed. Ask open ended questions like, "How's it going?" or make comments like, "You seem sad." Then listen carefully and avoid giving advice unless your child asks for it.

Help your child explore ways to cope with concerns and continue to be available for further discussion. Be ready to problem-solve with him or her. You may want to role play a situation that is causing anxiety.

Encourage your child to try new things by participating in one or two extracurricular activities. Help him or her understand that trying is what is important, and that one does not always have to be successful.

Continue to foster your child's organisational skills and assist him or her in becoming responsible and independent. Stay interested and provide rules and structure. Yet, allow your child to have input into what the rules are.

If after an adjustment period of time, your child is reluctant to go to school or seems truly unhappy, seek help. Identify your concerns and meet with your child's teacher and/or school counsellor. Together, perhaps with the child being present, work out a plan of action.



During times of change, a little extra attention will go a long way in helping children deal with stress. Plan an hour or a half hour each week where your child has your undivided attention. It is important to use playtime to help a child's development. Let your child pick the activity or follow your child's lead.


