Principal's Report

It's been lovely to welcome our new students and families to GPS, especially our Prep students who are very excited to be taking their first steps in their school journey! We have a terrific community at Greensborough Primary and we're looking forward to getting to know families better and supporting your children in the years ahead. We also welcome back our existing families and I sincerely hope everyone had a restful holiday break and enjoyed spending time with family and friends.

Our new staff member Vanessa Cunningham has received a warm welcome to GPS, as evidenced by the students' reactions when Vanessa was named 'PATHS Teacher of the Week' at assembly on Monday! Kristy Bedford has also settled in well with her new roles as Visual Art and Discovery Lego Teacher. New staff bring new ideas and Kristy has been very busy remodelling the Art Room. A huge thank you to our volunteers Wayne and Geoff, who removed existing shelving and storage in order to make way for new cupboards and display boards.

We're enjoying a very smooth start to the year. Our students are settling into the new routines of their classrooms, especially the Preps, and teachers are building relationships and getting to know the new personalities in their grades. Our specialist programs of Visual Arts, Library, STEM, Discovery Lego and Physical Education have gotten off to a great start, as have Magic Maths, Spelling Mastery, Oral Language, Extension Programs, Tutoring and Corrective Reading. All classes are completing a Start Up program focussing on collaborative learning and setting the protocols in place for class and school programs this year. This is where class and school values are discussed, procedures and processes to achieve optimum learning are put in place, and team work and social / behavioural protocols are established. Staff are applying Inquiry teaching strategies into class programs and Student Voice is being built into all aspects of our work, resulting in increased engagement, enjoyment and learning outcomes.

During the holidays, staff returned to school to set up their classrooms, plan together to ensure consistency in the delivery of teaching and learning programs across grades and ensure a smooth start to the year for our students. Our Pupil Free day on Friday 27th January was very productive as staff worked through the list of all students enrolled at the school to ensure there is understanding and consistency with important medical, social/emotional and academic information. We also completed our CPR update, and Respectful Relationship Professional Learning, so overall it's been a busy but very productive fortnight.

Building and Grounds

Whilst we had a restful break over the January holidays, we also took the opportunity to complete some regular maintenance and school ground improvements. Thank you to Margaret who coordinated several providers to complete extensive tree maintenance and ground works to keep our school grounds safe and in magnificent condition for our students return. We still require some of the softfall mulch that was delivered to the playgrounds to be spread around the equipment, so if anyone has any spare time at drop off or pick up, we would greatly appreciate your help. (We have rakes and wheelbarrows at school.)

The refurbishment of students' bathrooms is continuing and once the exterior block is completed, work will begin on the interior toilets. Families may have noticed some temporary scaffolding outside the Grade 3/4 area. This is in place whilst we are in the process of replacing the large floor to ceiling windows in the foyer.

Student Wellbeing

We are very excited this year to begin working with the Resilience Project and adding this highly effective program to our Social Emotional Learning curriculum. We have been able to access this program through the Mental Health Funding provided by DET. We have also used this funding to have Robyn, our Wellbeing Worker, work an additional day at GPS. Robyn is a great resource for students and families and works Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. If any families would like a referral for your child to see Robyn, please contact me.

It's been a pleasure on yard duty to see the enthusiasm of our new Student Wellbeing Leaders as they organise activities each day at our 'Friendship Tree'. For families new to the school, our Friendship Tree is located outside the Prep classroom and our Wellbeing Leaders in Grade 5/6 are rostered on each day to plan

and run creative tasks, e.g. crafts, sand castle competitions, etc. Thank you to Lynette, one of our ES staff members who coordinates our Student Wellbeing Leaders Program at the Friendship Tree.

Thankyou also to our Inter School Sports coaches who have been having training sessions during lunch breaks. Our students are enjoying the opportunity to hone their skills during these practice sessions. As well as ISS training and the Friendship Tree, we also have the 'Chill Out Zone' which is an indoor area available to students who like to play quiet games for part of their recess breaks.

A very big thank you to the Hill family who watered our vegetable garden over the holidays and also Linda from OSHClub and Liz our cleaner who shared the care of our rabbits and chickens with myself over the break. Words can't express our gratitude for their generous donation of time and expertise to ensure the vegetables, chooks and rabbits were kept nourished and safe over the break.

Parent/Teacher 'Meet and Greet' Sessions - Wednesday 22nd February

Information will be sent home via COMPASS for parents/carers of children in Grades 1 - 6 to book a time for Parent/Teacher 'Meet and Greet' sessions. Bookings for interview times will once again be via our COMPASS platform and barring any technical glitches, they'll go live next Monday 13th February at 5:00pm. If any parents/carers experience difficulty with the COMPASS booking process, please contact the office for assistance.

Families with more than one student attending GPS are advised to book early so that you are able to arrange sessions close together, rather than have large time gaps between meetings. So as not to inconvenience families, meetings will run on time and adhere to the ten-minute time allowance - if any parents require additional time, a further meeting can be arranged on another date. The 'Meet and Greet' sessions provide an opportunity for parents to meet with your child's new class teacher to share information about your child and discuss any relevant issues. Information about class programs, organisation and learning goals will also be provided to parents at this meeting. Prep parents are not required to attend the 'Meet and Greet' sessions as we have shared information during transition sessions. Parents of students who participate in Student Support Group meetings have been sent an invitation to arrange an SSG with their child's class teacher or attend the 'Meet and Greet'.

Twilight Sports - Tuesday 28th February

Don't forget to put the date of our Twilight Sports Night into your diary! This annual event will be held on the oval on Tuesday 28th February. This is a terrific night where students come dressed in their House colours and compete in their grade levels in House Teams, cheered on by their parents and family members. Dinner can be purchased from the Parents and Friends' Barbeque or families may bring a picnic with rugs and chairs. Our Grade 5 and 6 students run various stalls to raise money for Graduation, including Face Painting, Hair Spraying, Nail Polishing in House Colours and much more, so please bring along your gold coins! The barbeque will begin at 5:00pm and sporting events at 5:30pm. More information will be sent home closer to the date.



We are required to update student action management plans for asthma, allergy and anaphylaxis each year, so many families have received a letter recently requesting they visit their GP and return an updated copy to school. From DET: Staying safe from mosquitoes

Recent wet and warm weather has increased mosquito breeding. Mosquitoes can carry diseases that may be passed on to people through mosquito bites. A range of mosquito-borne diseases have recently been detected in mosquitoes in northern Victoria. Mosquito-borne diseases can cause serious illness, including infections of the brain, with children particularly at risk.

The best way to prevent mosquito-borne diseases is to avoid mosquito bites.

In line with community health advice, families can protect against mosquito bites by:

- Using insect repellent that contains picaridin or DEET on all exposed skin if outdoors when mosquitoes are observed, from October to March.
- Wearing long, loose-fitting clothing outdoors if possible if mosquitoes are around and covering exposed skin as much as possible. Summer school uniforms, including polos and shorts, can continue to be worn, but students should use insect repellent on exposed skin if mosquitoes are active.
- Limiting outdoor activity when mosquitoes are active.

Diamond Valley Community Support Financial Assistance

Diamond Valley Community support (DVCS) is an independent not-for-profit organisation that provides direct aid, assistance, support and information for people who live in the Banyule City Council area and have an address showing on their Centrelink card in one of the following suburbs: Briar Hill, Bundoora (part of), Eltham North (part of), Greensborough (part of), Lower Plenty, Montmorency, St Helena and Watsonia.

DVCS services currently include a Back-to-School Program, that provides eligible families a cheque for *\$100 per child* (up to \$500 per family). The cheque will be made out to the school, and is to be used for educational purposes, i.e. Subject Contributions, camps, excursions, and so on. From DET: Victoria-wide single-use plastics ban From 1 February 2023

Single-use plastics make up a third of the litter in our environment and are difficult and costly to clean up. They pollute the environment, harming wildlife and contaminating our food and water. They are also a poor use of resources – they are often used for only a few minutes and generate significant waste that is not recyclable. They can often easily be replaced with reusable products.

Under new regulations, from 1 February 2023, Victorian businesses and organisations (including schools) will not be able to sell, supply or provide a number of single-use plastic items. The ban applies to the following single-use plastic items made from conventional, degradable or compostable plastics:

- Drinking straws
- Cutlery including knives, forks, spoons, chopsticks, sporks, splades, food picks and sporks
- Plates
- Drink stirrers and sticks
- Cotton bud sticks

The ban also applies to:

• Food service items and drink containers made from expanded polystyrene. This includes expanded polystyrene plates, cups, bowls, clam shells and any cover or lid that is also made from expanded polystyrene.

Greensborough PS will be endeavouring to implement the Victorian government's single-use plastics ban in the items we use as a school community including at the canteen, OSHC, catering at fundraising events, classroom and staffroom activities and other school events etc. We will replace any banned single-use plastic items from 1 February 2023 with alternate options, however we acknowledge that there may be a transitional period as adopt this new policy.

Exceptions to the ban

People who need single-use plastic drinking straws due to a disability or for a medical need will still be able to purchase and use these items. If your child needs to continue using single-use plastic drinking straws because of a disability or medical need, please let their classroom teacher know and we will ensure that there is a supply available for your child's use at future school activities.

The Victorian government has produced a useful <u>Fact Sheet</u> explaining which items are banned and which are not, including information about exemptions.

Student lunches and snacks from home

Offences relating to the ban do not apply to private or domestic activities at home, e.g., individual families' decisions about lunch packaging. The intention of the government's new regulations is to remove these items from the supply chain prior to reaching the customer.






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Student Wellbeing

At Greensborough Primary School the wellbeing of our students, staff and families is at the forefront of everything we do. We have invested time, money and professional development for our staff to better implement our SEL program.

What is SEL?

SEL, or Social and Emotional Learning, is the process through which all young people and adults acquire and apply the knowledge, skills, and attitudes to develop healthy identities, manage emotions and achieve personal and collective goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain supportive relationships, and make responsible and caring decisions.

Within our classrooms currently, we are implementing *Respectful Relationships* as well as recently being fortunate enough to implement a fantastic and highly sought-after program called the *Resilience Project*.

The Resilience Project is committed to teaching positive mental health strategies to prevent mental ill-health and build young people's capacity to deal with adversity.

Teachers and students will engage in weekly lessons and activities around the key principles of Gratitude, Empathy, Mindfulness (GEM) and Emotional Literacy to build resilience.
