Principal's Report

Our Discovery Unit this term is focussing on health, and we've certainly appreciated the effects the bursts of sunshine are having on our mental health and wellbeing. Classes are also focussing on student safety, including when online. Our swimming lessons cover water safety and as we walk to the pool each Friday, we have a terrific opportunity to reinforce road safety. I draw parents' attention to yesterday's COMPASS post where we asked parents to reinforce with your children the importance of wearing helmets if cycling/scooting to school and crossing Grimshaw Street at the lights with the crossing supervisor.

We have also asked Banyule Council to enforce the parking time limits in Lorimer Street, so that parents can park in the bays to drop off and pick up students safely. With the building works across the road, the car spaces have been filled with tradespeople's cars for the entire day. Council has advised they will send a parking inspector and a traffic engineer to investigate the issue. I noted this morning that there were some vacant spaces for parents to park and we will continue to monitor the area. The issue was discussed at School Council on Monday night and we are proactively working to keep our students safe.

Harold from Life Education is visiting us again this term with each class studying a different health focus.

- Gr 5/6 Take A Breath: Students analyse e-cigarettes/vapes, understand nicotine's impact, and discuss social influences in vaping decisions.
- Gr 3/4 bCyber Wise: Students learn how to recognise, react & report unwanted contact and how to be responsible & respectful when online.
- Prep – 2 Harold's Friendship: Students will learn about their feelings and emotions as well as how to build healthy friendships.

Harold's visits are always a highlight of our school year and we're looking forward to learning new strategies or consolidating our knowledge of how to be both physically and mentally healthy this term.

Congratulations Chess champions!

We congratulate Oscar, Sawyer, Xavier and Adam, for reaching the State Finals in the Northern Star Primary School Chess Competition and competing strongly against students from other schools. Dear Parents,

Please find below information regarding the \$400 School Saving Bonus, 2025 student book packs and Parent Payment contributions.

School Savings Bonus

Whilst the school has not received any additional information from what we communicated to the school community last term, essentially, as we understand it, \$400 per enrolled student will be paid into the school account and parents can decide from the following list how they would like these funds to be expended.

Funds can be expended upon:

- Grade 3 – 6 Camp (2025 costs still being finalized)
- Excursions (2025 excursions still to be scheduled)
- Incursions (2025 cost for Footsteps Incursion is \$50 per student)
- Swimming (2025 cost for Pool entry is \$50 per student)
- Graduation
- School uniforms
- Textbooks
- Outdoor education programs

Grades 3 – 6 Camp

Over the next few weeks, information will be sent home to parents of 2025 students in Grades 3 – 6 regarding next year's Grades 3 – 6 Camp at Camp Angahook (Term Two – Wednesday 14th to Friday 16th May 2025)

Whilst costs are being finalized, the preliminary figures for the Grade 3 – 4 students show a camp cost of \$390 and the Grades 5 – 6 show a camp cost of \$460 as the older students also have a surfing lesson component.

When the camp information is sent out, an expression of interest form will need to be completed with parents having the option of indicating that they would like to use their **School Saving Bonus** to pay for camp or they would like to pay a \$50 deposit to commence a payment plan. There will be a comprehensive camp information session scheduled for later this term.

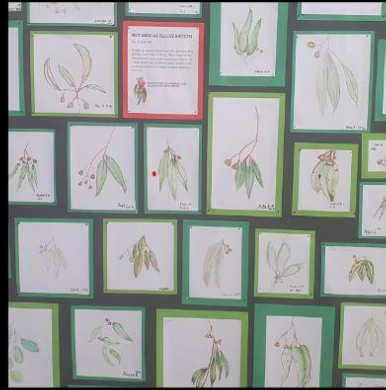

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STUDENT WELLBEING

Hi Everyone,

I think that most of us would have heard or read this quote in our lifetime. *'Give me a child until he is 7 and I will show you the man' - Aristotle.* What does it mean? Is it relevant now? It was written by Aristotle in 300BC!

Human babies are quite unique in that we are born far earlier in our development than most other living things. We are much more dependent on our parents in the beginning and first several years than most other living things. We cannot walk, feed ourselves, give ourselves shelter or ease our own pain. We are totally reliant.

In fact, our brains double in size in the first year after being born. By the time a child turns three, they are forming one million neural connections each minute. A developing human brain is soaking up and adapting to so much of its environment in those early years. This is a vital part of survival as we learn to navigate the big strange and interesting world we've newly arrived in.

- ❖ *Over a lifetime, how is it that the first 2,555 days of life (7 years) are the most telling and influential?*
- ❖ *By the age of seven, has the way a person views the world already been determined?*

THE SCIENCE!

MIND BLOWING!

The brain develops pretty rapidly during the first few years of life. Before our kids are three, they're already forming a million neural connections every minute. In basic terms, these are the pathways that teach our brain what it can expect and inform our body how to react to every situation it encounters and every task it performs. Neural connections are like the roots of a tree, and all growth comes from its foundation.

Studies have shown that these early experiences directly affect education, social life and relationships, even 20-30 years later.

GOOD NEWS! – Change is always a possibility

When all is said and done, I think we all believe, and at the very least hope, that we are all capable of new beginnings, life changing revelations and continual personal development.

Recent science has also shown the wonders of the **neuroplasticity of the brain. It's ability to change, take on new concepts, change our thinking.**

I know of many adults who have had adverse, even traumatic experiences throughout their early lives, BUT the intervention of some wonderful people in their lives, giving them positivity, helping them to develop positive character traits such as self-confidence, resilience, respectful relationships and to strive for the heights have enabled them to live fulfilling lives.

I am sure that we can all think of at least one significant person who, on our life journey, said or did something positive for us, that changed our **PATH, OUR SELF-WORTH, OUR LIFE VALUES** in positive ways – maybe a family member, a teacher, a coach, a special friend, a caring neighbour OR EVEN A STRANGER.

I know a PE teacher who grew up in various foster care homes from the age of 6 till 16 until she could no longer be in the foster care system (the age has risen since). With government assistance she found rental, got a part-time job and put herself through the rest of her schooling. With 3 part-time jobs she was able to put herself through Uni and become a PE teacher. She received accolades for her work from teachers and students. WOW, I wonder who the special person was who gave her the strength to have such a growth mindset and to overcome adversity!

Perhaps dealing with adversity in her early life, gave her the strength and determination – perhaps the first seven years actually helped determine who she is today. INTERESTING, hmmmm?



FOOD FOR THOUGHT!

Yes, we are a community and need to work together for the best outcomes for all. A PLEA – please be mindful of where your child is ‘absorbing’ the influences which will shape their character and life choices, in particularly the influences on social media platforms, you tube and what they read, observe and listen to.

Let's continue to work together and assist our children/young people to be the best they can be.

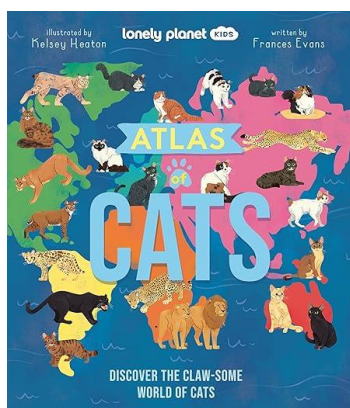
- ★ Creating a poster showing everything a cat needs to be happy

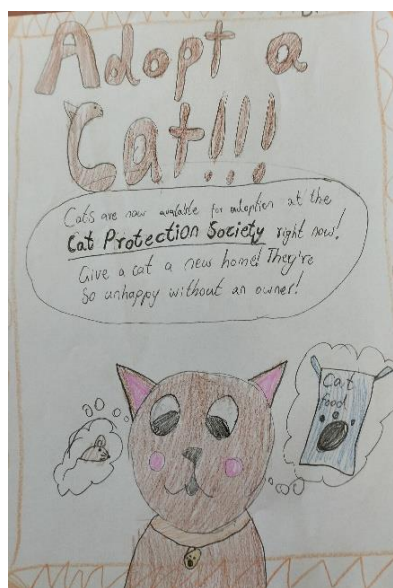

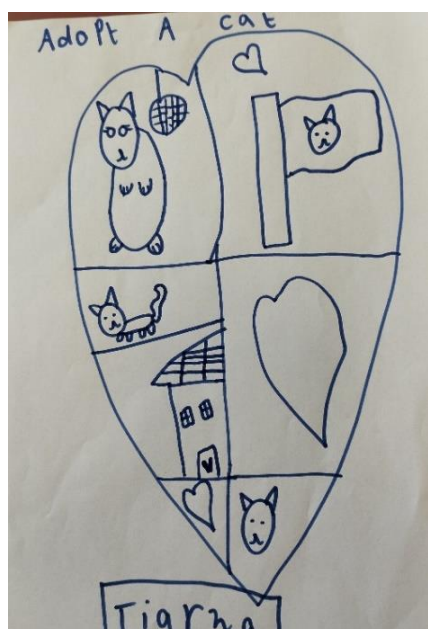

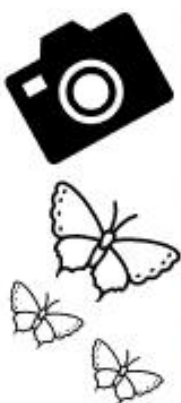
