Attitudes To School Survey Grades 4 - 6

We value Student Voice as a means to improving student engagement, wellbeing and quality instruction, and over the next fortnight, we are conducting a survey to find out what children in Grades 4 – 6 think of our school. 

STUDENT WELLBEING



Hi Everyone,

I was gobsmacked when a number of years ago I learnt that our capacity for EMPATHY is well on the way to being established by the ages of 3 or 4! AMAZING!

The capacity for **EMPATHY** develops gradually throughout childhood, with significant milestones emerging between 18 months and 4 years of age. While some signs of **EMPATHY**, like comforting a crying baby, can be seen as early as 18 - 24 months, a full understanding of others' perspectives typically emerges around age four. This milestone marks the ability to understand that other people have different beliefs and feelings from one's own.

Empathy is about standing in someone else's shoes, feeling with his or her heart, seeing with his or her eyes. Not only is empathy hard to outsource and automate, but it makes the world a better place.

Here's a more detailed look at the development of **EMPATHY**:

- Early Signs (18 24 months):
 - Infants and toddlers may exhibit simple acts of **EMPATHY**, like offering comfort or attempting to soothe someone in distress. These young children begin to respond to the distress of others and to show concern. These behaviours are often rooted in emotional contagion and imitation.
- Growing understanding of others (around 4 years):
 - Around age four, children begin to develop understanding that others have separate minds and intentions. This allows them to take on the perspective of others and **empathise** with their feelings.
- Cognitive Development (preschool and early school years):
 - As children's thinking and discernment skills mature, they can better understand and manage their own emotions, allowing them to connect with others' experiences without feeling overwhelmed.
- Social and Environmental Factors:
 - A child's empathy is also shaped by their social interactions, the behaviour of their caregivers, and the broader social environment and other family and environmental factors. EMPATHIC parents and teachers can serve as positive role models for young children, teaching them the importance of considering others' feelings.

In summary, while early signs of **EMPATHY** appear in infancy, the full capacity for **EMPATHY**, including the ability to understand and share the feelings of others, develops gradually throughout childhood, with key milestones occurring between 18 months and four years.

EXAMPLES from my own observances:

- It is always beautiful to see a very small child, under two years of age and over, show gentleness towards a baby or small animal.
- Often a small child will smile at and wave to an adult from their pram it puts a smile on the adult's face
 and may be the highlight of their day. They seem to sense this connection with elderly persons especially.
- If I was talking to a neighbour who stopped for a chat while I was gardening, my 2-3 year old daughter would run off and pick one of our flowers and give it to the lady.
- We were at a function when my about 18-month-old fell over. Her three-year-old brother picked her up and told her "It's alright, I'll carry you", as he carried her to a safe place. An older couple who witnessed the event often reminded us of this memory over many years.

In our next newsletter I would like to highlight what happens when our capacity for EMPATHY is disrupted, and how it can be restored and developed. So, let's continue to work together to help our students grow into

empathetic, caring young people!
