Principal's Report

It was terrific to see the joy and excitement shown by students as they engaged in our recent extracurricular activities of the Werribee Zoo excursion and Special Visitors Day. Parents are to be congratulated on the behaviour of your children as several staff were approached by members of the general public at the zoo, who commented on the students' excellent behaviour and manners. Students have been highly engaged in sharing their new learning and applying this knowledge in their Discovery Journals.



Our junior school students were also excited to showcase their talents and school programs to their special friends or family members. We thank everyone who participated and made the morning a great success and enjoyed the opportunity to build happy memories together.

As part of our Reconciliation Week activities our Grade 5/6 students wrote some excellent texts demonstrating their understanding of the importance of the 1967 Referendum for our First Nations people and the granting of citizenship rights. Students were highly engaged in this topic and teachers reported some very insightful discussions. I highly recommend reading Nick and Nyora's work which is published later in this newsletter.

Circus Program -Term 3!

Student Voice is very important to us at Greensborough Primary, and we have responded to student feedback and swapped our usual Term Three dance program with the Circus Crew program. Students will participate in six highly engaging circus skills sessions each Friday and the program will culminate with a concert for parents/family members (*Date and venue to be confirmed*).

The cost of the program is \$50, which includes bus transport to and from the concert venue. A compass post will be sent to families for consent and payment.



Circus classes are inclusive, creative and above all, fun! Tailored to the needs and abilities of our students and delivered in a familiar environment, it's all about exploring what students are capable of – and being amazed by the results. Activities include juggling, floor displays, balance routines, drama incursions – and much more. On top of the sheer joy of joining in, participation boosts confidence and concentration levels, builds invaluable teamwork skills, improves co-ordination and uncovers hidden talents.



Grades 5 & 6 Term Two News

In Literacy this term, 5/6 students have been learning about the 1967 Referendum. As a culmination to our unit, students developed a factual recount based on their new knowledge. Please read two wonderful examples below.

Nick - 5/6A

1967 Referendum

In 1967, a referendum to change the constitution was held so Aboriginal people could get more recognition. First Nations people didn't have equal rights. In 1967, changes to the constitution were made so Indigenous Australians felt more included in the country. These changes were so they felt safe and important in their country.

Prior to the 1967 Referendum, Indigenous people weren't considered part of the Australian population, facing discrimination and segregation. Although the Indigenous people were the first inhabitants of the land, before 1967, they weren't considered part of the population. Prior to the 1967 Referendum, Indigenous people faced racism and segregation because of their race, culture and lack of rights. Due to everything going on in the world (wars and women's rights movements), activists noticed how poorly Indigenous people were treated and decided to act on it. Indigenous people were not considered part of the Australian population being met with discrimination and segregation before the 1967 Referendum.

Events leading up to the referendum showed protests, activism and petitions involving Indigenous peoples with them wanting change to the constitution. Leading up to the referendum, protests started to happen, mostly the Freedom Ride of 1965, which was a 15-day trip to share views of inclusivity. In 1962, Indigenous people were given the right to vote which was a huge step for the equality of Aboriginals and white people. A petition soon stated for a referendum to give Indigenous people equal rights, gaining over 100,000 signatures. Protests, activism and petitions involving Indigenous people wanting a change to the constitution all happened leading up to the 1967 Referendum.

Life after the referendum showed positive changes to the treatment of Indigenous people although it's still not perfect to this day. The referendum made positive changes to the constitution after a long decade of protests. After the referendum, the government formed a group of Indigenous people in parliament to give them a say in laws and land changes. The 90.77% yes vote in the referendum showed majority of the population cared about Indigenous Australians. Being counted in the Australian population was a very important step for the equality and Indigenous Australians. Although not perfect, the life of Indigenous Australians has definitely improved since the referendum.

Prior to the referendum, Indigenous Australians weren't granted the rights they deserved, causing activists to fight for their equality. A referendum was called to change the constitution about the disgusting mistreatment of the First Nations people, giving them equal rights. The changes made in 1967, significantly improved the lives of Indigenous peoples, giving them the power to vote and be legally considered part of the population.

1967 Referendum

In 1967, a referendum was called to change the constitution, allowing First Nations people to be counted in the Australian population. Prior to 1967, First Nations Australians did not have the same rights as non-Indigenous people and weren't considered in the Australian population. Throughout the 1960s, society slowly realised the segregation and discrimination between the different races due to activists raising awareness, so the constitution would be changed.

Prior to the 1967 Referendum, First Nations people were experiencing segregations and racism based on their skin tone. During the 1960s, Aboriginals weren't counted in the Australian population and were not considered humans. Due to not being part of the Australian population, First Nation people did not have equal rights and were experiencing segregation and discrimination. Non-Indigenous people were mining on the Aboriginal's land and were not treating Aboriginals with the respect that they deserved. Indigenous people were not treated with respect and were being discriminated against by non-Aboriginals before the referendum.

Leading up to the referendum, activists were protesting for Aboriginals to have more rights. During the mid-1960s, society slowly realised the segregation between the two different races. Activists were protesting so that they could raise awareness for how poorly the Aboriginals were being treated and to share other perspectives. One of the many protests was called 'The Freedom Ride,' where non-Indigenous people hired a bus and started travelling from Sydney for 15-days, raising awareness of inclusivity. Before the referendum was called, activists held protests and created a petition to change how Aboriginal people were treated.

After the referendum was held, the constitution was changed so Aboriginals had more rights and felt more included. In 1967 after the constitution was changed, Indigenous people gained more rights and were receiving less segregation and racism. After the constitution was changed, an Indigenous representative was added to the government which led to Aboriginals feeling satisfied and happy with the decision. Shortly after, Aboriginals were added to the Australian population. Non-Indigenous people were more respectful about their land. After they changed the constitution, Aboriginals were more included and gained more rights.

During the 1960s, activists raised awareness to show how poorly the Indigenous people were being treated. Shortly after, Australians started to agree and eventually society decided to hold a referendum to change the constitution. Before the referendum, life was not fair for the Aboriginals as they did not have the same rights as non-Indigenous people and were not being treated fairly. When the constitution was changed, it meant that Aboriginals were now legally apart of the Australian population and had more rights which meant there was more hope for the future for First Nations Australians.


STUDENT WELLBEING

Hi Everyone,

Each of us goes through ups and downs. It's not the circumstances or challenges in one's life that define a person, but it's how one perceives those challenges and is willing to make the necessary changes, ready to face them head on, that truly defines ones' character.



This is a real learning process for our children as each day is a new growing experience as they learn to navigate their world – their world of school, friendship, physical growth, changing perceptions, etc....



What makes the diamond so strong is also what makes it so beautiful. Intense heat and pressure cause carbon to crystalise over many, many years. Formed deep within the earth's mantle, diamonds are brought to the earth's surface during pressure and change. Once a diamond is thrust to the surface for air, the cutting process begins! The more the diamond is tested, tried, cut and polished, the more it is able to reflect! The more you overcome the more valuable you ultimately become to those around you.

How do you handle challenges? Have you learned to develop any qualities, such as patience, perseverance, adaptability, resilience, faith, optimism, a sense of purpose, tenacity, love, empathy, ingenuity, flexibility, or the ability to prioritise, control your emotions, and make informed decisions or surrounded yourself with a support network?

A FOCUS ON FRIENDSHIPS

Often a child will come upset because of a friendship issue they experienced at school. Friendships can be tricky, and we all have different levels of coping skills. I remember my son coming home and saying what he played with his friend even though he didn't like playing the game and wanted to do something different. I asked him whether he suggested a different game they could play. He stated 'No, because he is my friend, and I have to do what he wants.' Also, my son would always do what his younger sister wanted to do. One day he told me that he wants to do other things. I told him that this was OK and explained to his sister that it is fun to play together but sometimes it is OK to do different things too. It was a 'rocky' transition, but they managed to reach an equilibrium, well most of the time!!

We invited his friend over for 'play dates' and his friend learnt other activities can be fun too! We also widened our son's friendship circle by inviting other school friends over at different times. Soon he was old enough to join a couple of clubs outside school and made new friends as well.

Sometimes, we need to focus on the positive things – if your child is having 'trouble' with a friend, ask who else do they like to play with; what was fun about today. Then, while acknowledging their feelings, show how proud you are that they are making good decisions and how important it is to enjoy time with different people. Often you will find that they found someone else to play with and had fun that day.

There are some great picture books on friendships to share with your children such as 'Friendship is like a Seesaw' by Shona Innes and 'I'm Sorry' by Sam McBratney. Sometimes children catastrophise 'nobody likes them' if someone doesn't want to play with them. Children need to know that they can still be friends, even if they play with someone else for a day. For young children friendship is quite fluid. Be supportive and help them focus on the positives. Role playing is very useful to help them think of ways of coping in different situations. ALWAYS REMEMBER TO FOCUS ON THE POSITIVE, while acknowledging challenges.

OH, remember even diamonds can have flaws! So, let's aim to be the best WE, individually, can be and work together to encourage our kids to confidently face challenges too. If we were perfect, we wouldn't need each other and THAT WOULD BE SAD!
