Principal's Report

Welcome back to a busy Term Four. We certainly hit the ground running with the Grades Prep – Four having a Healthy Eating Incursion, the Grades Five and Six having a Sex Education session and all students taking part in the Swimming program. Extension programs in Reading and Writing for students in Grades Two to Five commenced, a group of Grade Two and Three students were selected for an extension sports program, and a Monday lunchtime Christmas Craft program began. Along with all of this, across the curriculum, assessment and moderation is taking place for both end of year reports and planning for next year.

There is a lot of work happening in regard to the school buildings and facilities but most of this won't be easily seen or recognised. Over the past weekend, a window replacement program began, and preliminary planning has taken place for upgrades to the school's electrical capacity, sewerage system and roofing issues. On a more obvious level, Coree Thorpe (Indigenous Artist) is about to embark on Stage Two of the fence mural and measurements and quotes are taking place to install noise absorbing wall tiles in the last three classrooms waiting to be upgraded (1/2B, 5/6A and 5/6B). Also, excitingly, we are about to have a new playground addition (a spider net climbing frame) installed on the Lorimer Street boundary of the school. This piece of equipment has been made possible with the funding from the hard work of Parents and Friends, funds received for hosting International Students and an additional donation towards the equipment from Beyond Education which is the company that coordinates the international students who have short visits at our school. This piece of equipment is the first of a planned redevelopment of this play area of the school.

Detailed information has been sent out via a COMPASS post regarding the 2026 Parent Payment schedule, and this is also attached to this newsletter. We are deeply appreciative of the support of the community in assisting us to maintain high quality resources and well-funded programs.

Information has also been sent out to families advising of the planned classroom teacher allocation for 2026. This plan is based upon everything we know at the moment and, if any changes occur, we will let the community know straight away.

Tomorrow a COMPASS post will come out to ensure everyone is aware of a new activity we will be having this year – A Halloween Day. On Friday 31st October we will be having a Halloween Day at school. This is not something we have done before but there was community interest raised about the school hosting an event for the students so we thought we would trial it for this year.

The plan will be that, at 9:15am, there will be a Halloween Costume Parade. We don't want this to be a stress or burden to anyone – a simple mask would be fine. We will have a few items available at school for students who don't have a costume option. After this there will be seven Treat Stations around the perimeter of the school. Each grade will start at a different Treat Station and will make their way around the school visiting all stations. There will be a balance of choices with a few lolly options but also healthy food choices and small bubbles etc. At the conclusion of the trick or treating students will return to their classrooms to have a Halloween activity. After recess the Prep – Grade Two students will have a Halloween Disco in the hall from 11:30am to 12:20pm and the Grades Three – Six will have a Disco from 12:40pm to 1:30pm. We hope it will be a great day and will seek feedback as to whether or not we should make this a regular event on our school calendar. All the costs associated with Halloween Day are being paid for by the M80 Road project to support the school in acknowledgement of the difficulties caused by the road closures.

The school is acutely aware of the challenges some families are facing with traffic delays, and we want to assure you that if you are held up in traffic and are running late for the school pick up, your children are being well looked after. We have supplies in so we can provide afternoon tea for children while they are waiting, and they will be supervised until you arrive.

While Angela is on sick leave, I am back running the school and, as always, if you have any queries or concerns or would like any information or support, please do not hesitate to make contact.

Dear School Families,

School Council have now ratified the 2026 Curriculum charges, and these are set out below.

The only costs for families beyond the Parent Payment Schedule will be:

- The cost of Camps, Excursions /Incursions, Transport costs for interschool sport and athletics, Pool admission for Swimming and the Circus lessons incursions.
- For 2026 the cost of Student Backpacks has been included in the Parent Payment Schedule so parents will no longer be required to order individually from MAXIM. This way, all resources required for student use will be delivered at the end of 2025 and everything will be in place for the start of the 2026 school year.

As part of the Education Department's updated policy on the collection of Parent Payments for essential school items, we are no longer able to issue statements beyond the information below however, upon request, Mehgan is able to provide an updated statement of amounts owed or payments made.

Hi Everyone!



My Hubby always smiles at the current ad on TV depicting a large bird, not unlike an eagle, swooping down to rescue a small bird and its egg from a storm, safely carrying the bird and catching the egg, returning both safely to the little bird's nest! It's nice seeing his Hubby's 'soft' side, BUT I DIGRESS!

Actually, there is much that children and young people, and ourselves, can learn from the magnificent eagle:

FOCUS AND VISION

- **Focus:** Eagles can spot prey from a mile away and keep their eyes on their target until they catch it. This teaches children to focus on your goals.
- **Embrace your instincts:** Eagles have powerful eyesight and physical abilities. This encourages children to use their own strengths to their full potential.



FACING CHALLENGES

- **Use life's storms to your advantage:** When a storm comes, eagles use the wind to fly above it, while other birds hide. This shows that challenges can be used to rise to new heights, which make you stronger.
- **Embrace change:** An eagle may have to go through a painful process of shedding old feathers and breaking its beak to grow new ones. This shows that sometimes we must let go of old habits that hold us back, even when it's difficult, to become better.

GROWTH AND COMFORT

- **Leave your comfort zone:** Eagles are pushed out of their nests by their mothers, who remove soft materials and sometimes nudge them into the air. This teaches that comfort can hold you back from growth and self-reliance.
- **True love is empowering:** A mother eagle doesn't coddle her eaglets; she pushes them until they learn to fly on their own. This teaches that true love involves challenging and preparing children for the real world. Eagles must have courage to take the first leap from the nest to learn to fly. This can teach children that they need courage to step out of their comfort zones and try new things.
- **Be independent:** Eagles often fly alone, which can teach children the importance of being independent and self-sufficient.
- **Be determined:** Eagles are known for their strength and powerful flight. Children can learn from their determination and the ability to soar to great heights through persistence. Eagles build their nests high up, which can be an analogy for setting high goals in life and striving for spiritual or personal achievement.
- **Embrace challenges:** Eagles are unique because they use storms to their advantage, riding the winds to rise higher. This teaches children that challenges can be opportunities for growth.
- **Be resilient:** The process of an eaglet learning to fly, and the eagle's periodic self-renewal by shedding old feathers, also teaches children about persistence and renewal.



So, let's continue to work together and give our children & young people the skills they need to SOAR WITH PERSEVERANCE, RESILIENCE, INDEPENDENCE, COURAGE & FOCUS. May they rise above the 'storms' and reach their full potential and achieve their goals.

Science Day Celebrations at GPS



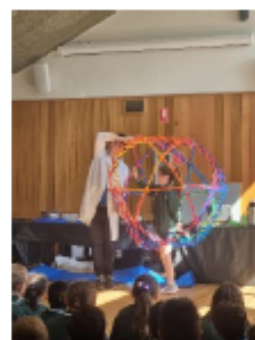
This year our National Science Week theme, was DECODING THE UNIVERSE. At GPS, we wanted to integrate this theme throughout the day and our Incursion. Students participated in multiage activities from 9am to 1.30, where they finished the day reflecting in their classroom.

Students completed 4 activities- planet knowledge and ordering. Constellations, where students looked at our Indigenous Australians connections to our sky and what constellations they can make. Students also worked together to make a Space Lander that could transport two 'Aliens' to Earth, without falling out. They had to collaborate, problem solve, test, edit and measure. Lastly, students linked their technology understanding by working with the Stop Motion app, to create a design linked with space and space travel.



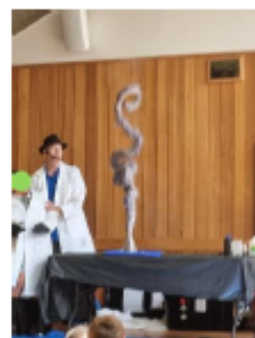
It was awesome to see students of all ages, being inclusive, encouraging, being problem solvers and showing their persistence with the range of science activities.

Students finished the week with attending the whole school incursion from the **Mad About Science** incursion company. We participated in the **Cosmic Chemistry Show** and it was a massive hit. BSC AND ASC (Source Coding)

Recently, we've been receiving lots of feedback about our menu – which we absolutely LOVE! Please keep it coming. Each week, we'll post a photo of our BSC (Before School Care) and ASC (After School Care) menus, along with our weekly planners. This way, you can see what's happening, give feedback, and even share new ideas in the comments. If you do, we'll do our best to add them into our program.

Just a quick reminder: Afternoon tea at ASC is designed as a light snack, not a main meal. It's something to keep children fuelled and happy until they get home for dinner. We know these planners and menus can look a little overwhelming at first, so here's a quick guide to help you understand how we plan and where our ideas come from.

What 'Source Coding' Means

In our planning, we use something called Source Coding (or the Source Key). An example could be (E.C, CM, 25/09/25) which means – this activity/food suggestion came from Emmerson Collins (child's initials) in a Children's meeting (CM) on this date. It's just a simple way of showing where each activity idea comes from. Think of it like a label:

- CM = Children's Meeting (ideas that came directly from the kids)
- Obs = Observation (an educator noticed a child's interest during play)
- F = Family Input (suggestions from parents and caregivers)
- EA = Extended Activity (building on a previous learning experience)
- SP = Sustainable Practice (activities that link to caring for our environment)

This helps everyone see the story behind each activity.

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
